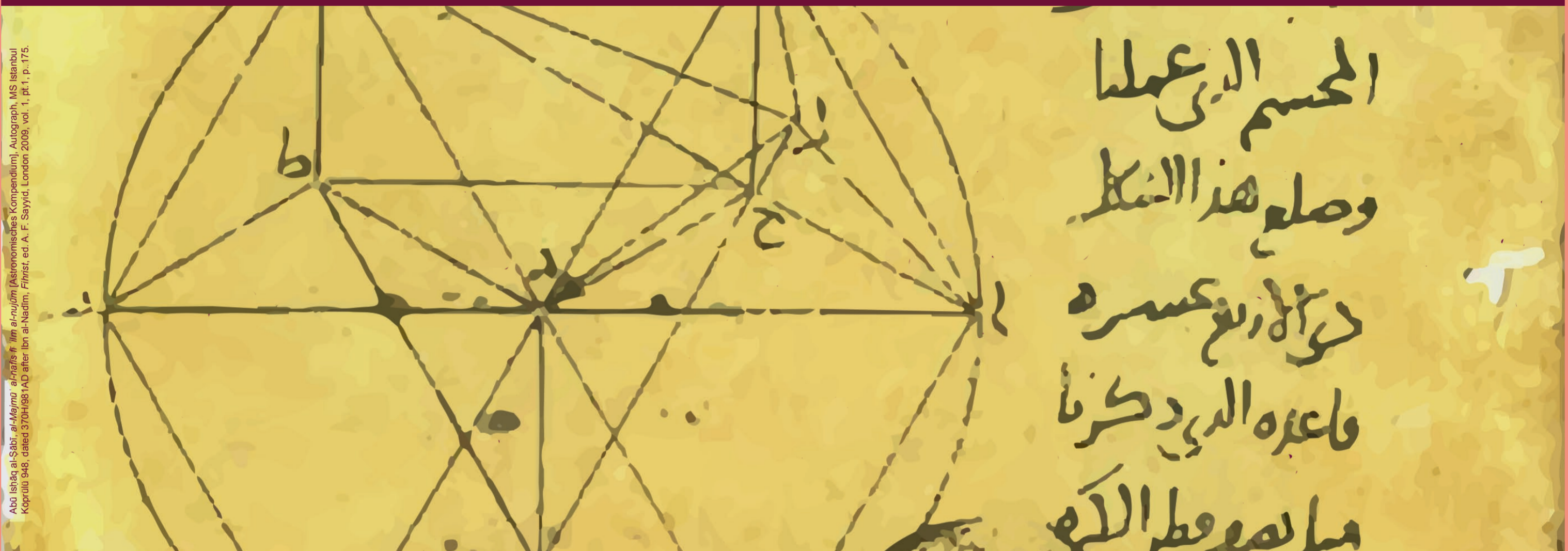

DIMITRI GUTAS

**“The Reception of Aristotle
in the Long Ninth Century
in Early Abbasid Iraq”**

Dimitri Gutas is professor of Arabic and Graeco-Arabic studies at Yale University. He has published on the medieval Graeco-Arabic translation movement and its lexicography, the transmission of Greek philosophical texts into Arabic, and the development, phases, and personalities of Arabic philosophy, notably on Avicenna. Most recently he has published, with Leonardo Tarān (Columbia) the editio maior of the Greek text of Aristotle's *Poetics*, and the second and revised edition of his classic *Avicenna and the Aristotelian Tradition*.

Julia Bray has been the Laudian Professor of Arabic at the University of Oxford since 2012, and previously taught at the University of Paris 8 Vincennes-Saint Denis and several universities in the UK. She has published on medieval Arabic poetry, story-telling and life-writing, and on gender and the family, the social reception of medicine, and the education of the emotions. With Wen-chin Ouyang (SOAS, London) she edits the series *Edinburgh Studies in Classical Arabic Literature*.

GEERT JAN VAN GELDER

**“From Seriousness to Jest and
vice versa in the Geography

Geert Jan van Gelder studied Semitic Languages at the Universities of Amsterdam and Leiden. He was employed as Lecturer in Arabic at the University of Groningen until 1998, when he was elected Laudian Professor of Arabic at the University of Oxford. He retired in 2012, returning to the Netherlands in 2015, but is still employed by the University as Wellcome Research Fellow. He has published widely on Classical Arabic Literature. Recent publications include *Sound and Sense in Classical Arabic Poetry* (2012) and, with Gregor Schoeler, an edition and translation of Abū l-'Alā' al-Ma'arrī's *Epistle of Forgiveness* (2013).

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
